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Justicecraft: Imagining Justice in Times of Conflict

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What is justicecraft?

We define **Justicecraft** as a conceptual framework that captures contested struggles for justice by focusing on the **skills**, **knowledge**, **labor**, **affect**, and **materiality** involved in political change. We frames justice as a form of craft, emphasizing the processes through which people actively produce justice on the ground, including the means, instruments, language, and claims used.

Justicecraft operates as a **holistic, evolving, and inclusive approach**, recognizing that justice-making is dynamic and context-dependent. It emphasizes the political and social shifts that emerge during these processes, shedding light on the diverse and sometimes competing ways justice is understood, claimed, and implemented across different temporal and spatial settings.

This concept broadens the study and practice of justice by challenging traditional frameworks, such as transitional justice, that often impose rigid boundaries of time, space, and methods. Instead, it highlights grassroots and community-based initiatives as central to crafting justice and addressing injustices in nuanced and situated ways.

5 ELEMENTS OF JUSTICECRAFT


Skills are abilities acquired through training and practice that facilitate justice-seeking initiatives.

Knowledge is the valued information generated through experiences, observation, and awareness.

Labor represents the physical, emotional, and intellectual efforts required in justice processes.

Affect refers to the emotions, expressions, and collective responses that drive justice processes.

Materiality refers to the physical manifestations of justice, such as memorials, artifacts, and resources that symbolize and sustain justice processes.
